

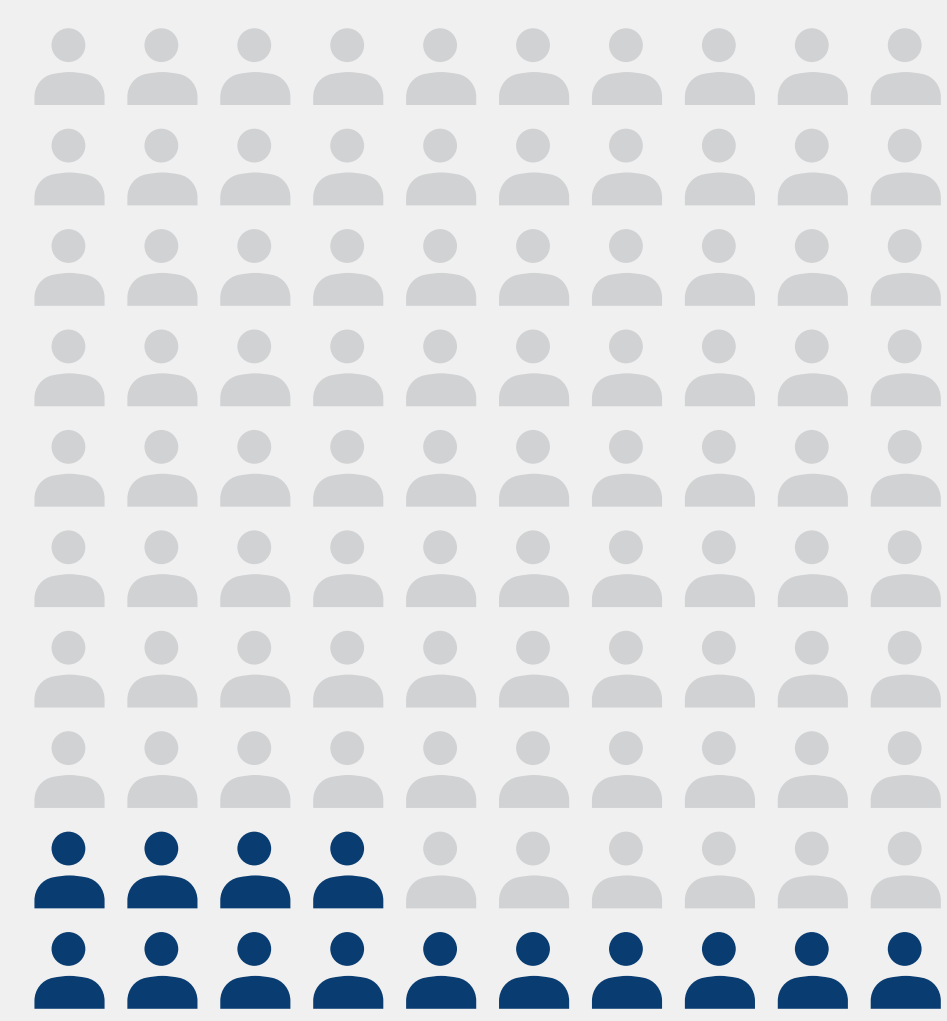
Online Hate & Harassment

The American Experience 2023

Jewish people reported an increase in online hate and harassment from last year. They were more worried about future harassment than last year and more likely than in past years to avoid identifying as Jewish.



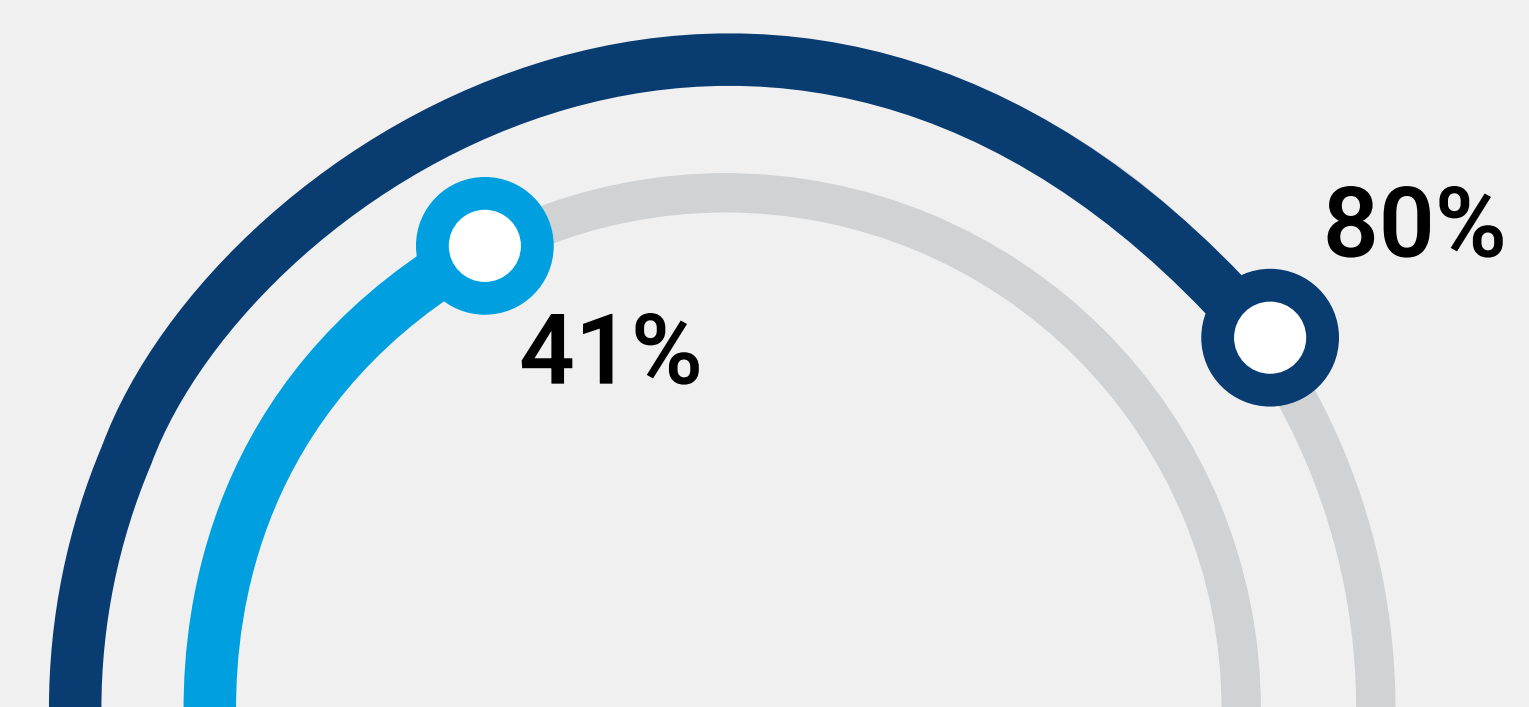

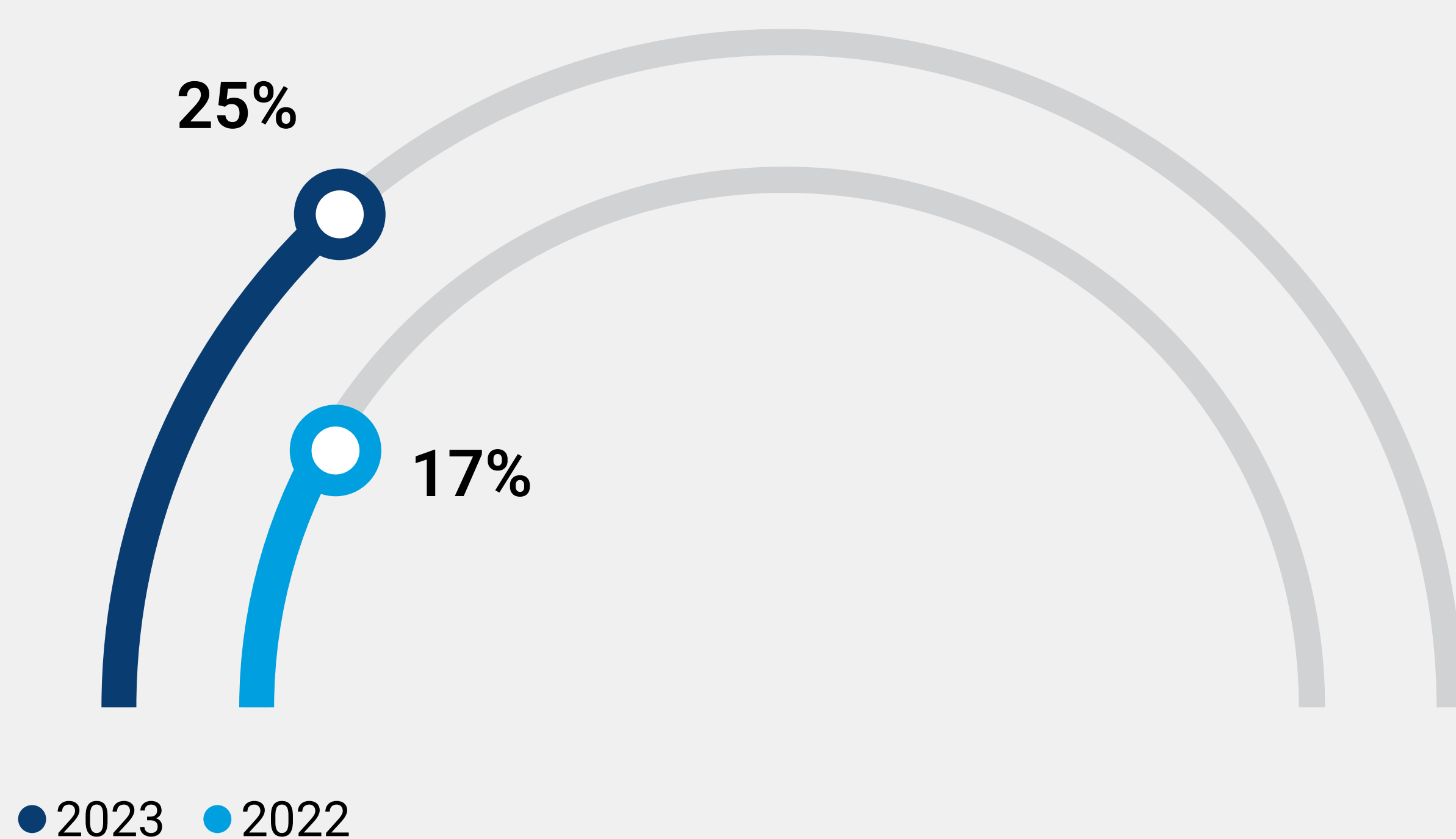
of Jewish people reported severe harassment in the past 12 months, up from 9% in 2022

Jewish people were more likely to worry about being harassed for their religion, compared to non-Jews



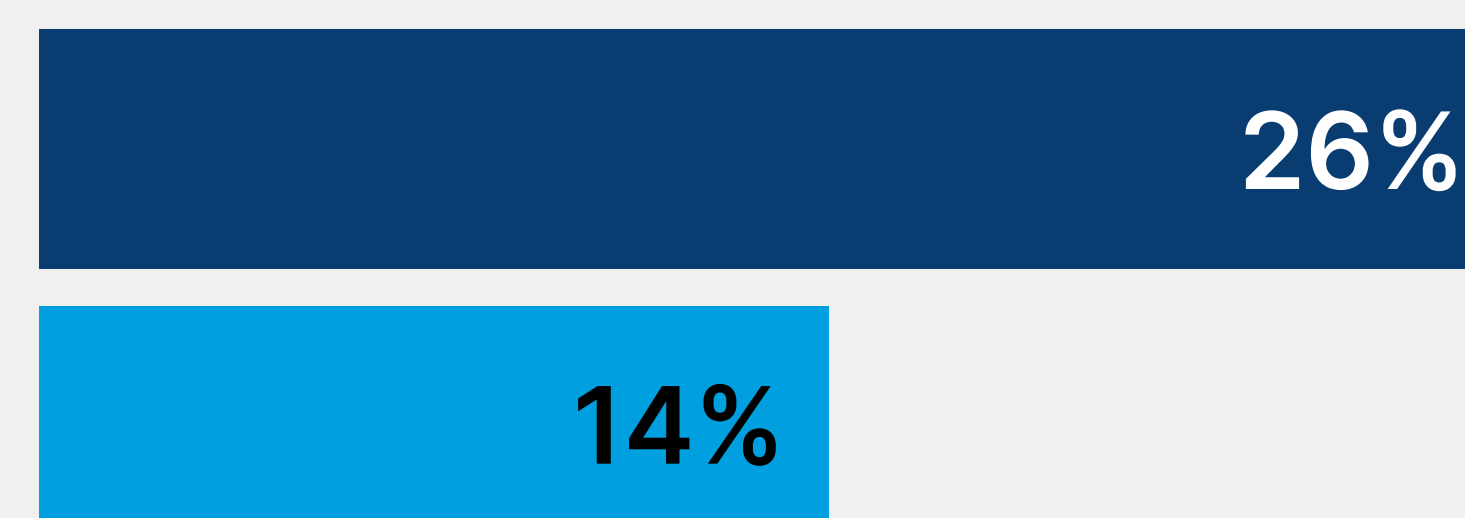
● Jews ● Non-Jews
